Vadodara, formerly known as Baroda, is the third largest city of Gujarat, nestled along the banks of the Vishwamitri River. It served as the capital of the princely state of Baroda, ruled by the Gaekwad dynasty, whose influence can be seen in the city's architecture and cultural traditions. The city's prominence as a cultural hub stems not only from its historical role but also from its vibrant arts scene, celebrated festivals and renowned educational institutions like Maharaja Sayajirao University.

Vadodara is known as a cultural city or sanskarinagari ma, a title earned due to its vibrant cultural scene and historical prominence. It holds a special place as the cultural city of Gujarat, a hub of art, music and intellectuals.

The NATIONAL CADET CORPS(NCC) is a voluntary organization, founded in the year 1948, holds the highest position in nurturing the prestigious youth of our nation. It upgrades the quality of an individual who is a part of it in terms of instilling values such as unity, discipline, leadership and service. NCC runs the motto of "Unity and Discipline" in each and every cadet. Thus, it can be proudly stated that NCC contributes an important role in shaping and moulding the future of the developing nation.

The NCC Enrollment for the year 2024 at GSFC University, part of 1-GCTRUnit [ARMYWing], had taken place on Saturday, August 3, 2024 between 7:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. at two locations GSFC Pavilion (Physical Efficiency Test) and SOS Conference room (Interview test). The primary goal of the event was to identify as well as recruit the students who were capable enough to become ideal cadets and who were aspiring to become the part of NCC. The selection trial offered a platform for students to demonstrate their potential and show-case their commitments to wear the 'Khakhi' uniform and hence become a Cadet.

The Enrollment event was attended by a couple of dignitaries. We were honored by the presence of the Group Commander of Baroda Group, Brigadier Y. S. Sanwal; Commanding Officer of 1-GCTR, Col. R. S. Rajput; Administrative Officer of 1-GCTR, Lt. Col. M S Ghumman and Vice Chancellor of GSFC University Dr. G. R. Sinha. Along with them 3 P. I. Staff members were also present.

The selection procedure is designed in such a way that it cumulatively tests the physical endurance as well as the nonverbal communication skills. The count of the attended candidates was pretty good. For 28 seats (14 for each: boys and girls), a total of 67 attended and had undergone the selection process; making it a tough evaluation process for both, the candidates and also for the interviewer, C.O. Sir. Firstly, the candidates had to undergo through Physical Efficiency Test (P.E.T.) which was a combination of three physical performance tests. The list included running test: 800meters for Girl candidates' and 1600 meters for Boy candidates. The second criteria in the list were Push-ups: 15 for Girl candidates and 2 of or Boy candidates. The third and the last criteria under P. E. T. were Sit-ups(crunches): 2 of or each candidate. Thus, the candidates were made to pass through the rigorous evaluation under the Physical Efficiency Test. The evaluation process was inspected by Mr. Mukund Jha, NCC

Officer, GSFCU and the P. I. Staff. Also, the test process was also assisted by existing T. Y. and S. Y. Cadets. The candidates were required to perform the best and compete with each other in order to be in the merit list for attempting the interview.

The next criteria under the two-step selection as well as evaluation were face to face interview where in C. O. Sir interviewed the candidates and evaluated them as per the basis of their ability and performance in terms of communication and oral skills. Subsequently, the candidates were evaluated as per their performance and were graded by C. O. Sir. The final merit list which would shortlist the selected candidates for the enrollment was made by summing up the grades of the P. E. T. and the interview marks. The list thus makes a fair decision and also filters out the candidates who are capable as well as eligible for the enrollment.

After the completion of the Interview process, C.O. Sir had addressed the participants as well as the Cadets. The core message he delivered through his addressing speech was that he wanted to make know the participants who attempted the selection trial that to not to get disheartened if you don't make it to the merit list, rather learn, grow and contribute to the nation in every possible way and also advised to first become a good citizen of India. His one and only teaching for the interview was to first be yourself. Further he added to his speech that there is no substitute to hard work, one needs strong dedication and willing power to achieve anything in life. He also added that each and every candidate must analyze his/her own interview questions and find out where did they lagged. He also motivated the listeners by sharing his own story of how he entered into the Indian Army despite mountain like challenges and hurdles. His words were giving goose bumps to all cadets who were aspiring for going into Indian Armed Forces. Thus, the addressing speech of C.O. Sir filled the atmosphere with an aura of motivation and positivity.

The completion of his addressing speech marked the end of the day but not the enrolment process. The most awaited result or final merit list was yet to be announced. It was declared by Mr. Mukund Jha that the result would be revealed on Monday. After that he made understand the advantages and allowances given to NCC Cadets. Plant-based Meat offers significant advantages over Animal meat products, including numerous health and environmental benefits. Consuming plant-based proteins can improve gut health due to their high Fiber content and contribute to weight management through increased satiety. These proteins are also rich in essential nutrients such as vitamins, minerals and antioxidants, which can enhance immune function and reduce the risk of chronic diseases. Environmentally, plant-based proteins require fewer resources, such as water and land and produce lower green house gas emissions compared to animal proteins, making them a more sustainable choice.

Plant based meat, additionally called vegan meat or meat substitutes has become more and more popular in times as more consumers are looking for environmentally pleasant food alternatives. These merchandises are made from plant derived ingredients like soy, peas and grains carefully crafted to mimic the flavour, texture and appearance of meat. The growing acceptance of vegan meat can be attributed to reasons, consisting of the growing cognizance of the effect of animal farming fitness issues related to meat consumption and a choice for ethical meals choices that lessen animal harm. With recognition of those problems, the demand for plant-based meat continues to rise gradually reflecting a broader trend, in the direction of sustainable consuming conduct that resonates with current values and well-being objectives.

According to recent information on the meat substitute market to be estimated at 355.85 million USD in 2024 and is expected to reach 651.85 million USD by 2029, growing at a CAGR (Compound Annual Growth Rate) of 12.87% during the forecast period (2024-2029). As vegan meat is prepared from plant products hence it will reduce slaughter. It will also help in reducing diseases and complications that are carried out by consuming real meat, help in reducing coronary artery disease, colorectal cancer and also help to prevent Trichinosis. Plant based products used in making vegan meat help in digesting it very easily. Though it gets digested easily it reduces the damage to the digestive tract. It is a rich source of protein which helps for muscle building and other bodily functions including enzymatic reactions and growth factors. They are rich in antioxidants, vitamins and Fibers as well. The objective is to increase the market size of plant-based meat protein in India from \$30-40 million to \$500 million. A survey conducted in 2021 reveals that a mere 9% of the Indian population adheres to a vegan lifestyle. India's plant-based meat market was worth USD 38.2 million in 2021 and is further projected to reach 836.2 million by 2028, at a CAGR of 54.7% during 2022-2028.

The Global plant-based meat market size was valued at 4.40 billion in 2022 and is expected to grow at a CAGR of 24.9% from 2023-2030. The market in USD is 5.23 billion in 2023 at a CAGR of 23.9%.

About Vadodara City

Located on the banks of the "Vishwamitri River" southeast of Ahmedabad, Vadodara is well-known for its exquisite gardens, art galleries and temples that encircle the historic city center. Vadodara's estimated age is two millennia or more, according to historians. The initial local inhabitants of Vadodara were Hindus and they dominated the city until 1297. When they began to explore the area at the beginning of the Christian era, the Gupta Territory was the first to control Vadodara. After a fierce battle, Vadodara gave victory to the Solanki dynasty. Years later, the Mughals ruled the city, but they were ultimately overthrown by Gaekwad, the monarch. The main reason for Vadodara's beauty is "Sayajirao Gaekwad," the city's recognized king.

Today, Vadodara is renowned across the world for its unique combination of captivating wonders, a bustling street culture and breathtaking artwork. "The Laxmi Vilas Palace" a former museum, is the best example of Indo-Saracenic style. Chief Charles Man testimated the palace's location in 1880 and it is the main tourist destination in the Vadodara area. A short distance away from the "Laxmi Vilas Palace" lies the "Maharaja Fateh Singh Museum," which is well-known for its remarkable collection of paintings by the well-known artist Raja Ravi Verma.

At the foot of the Pavagadh, Champaner has massive gates guarding graves, palaces, a mosque and a fortress. Perched atop the "820-meter-tall Pavagadh Hill, Pavagadh Fort's medieval defenses" bear witness to the turbulent history of the country. By climbing the "Pavagadh fort", you might be able to glimpse the well-known "Sat Mahal". One remarkable example of Chauhan architecture is this magnificent seven-story structure. There are various parameters due to which the city of Vadodara has been called the cultural city of the Gujarat state in India. The few of the supporting parameters for the justification of the cultural city of Gujarat State have been mentioned herewith:

1. Music

Supporting music was already ingrained in the state of Baroda. Artists were traditionally assigned to work at the palace, a tradition that Maharaja Sayajirao-II began after ascending to the throne in 1820. The state wrote to the artists appointing two kalawantini, two pakhawaj, dafvajitravala and a few more singers in the court. In the same vein as his father, Maharaja Ganpatrao Gaekwad is recognized for having provided assistance to several gifted artists, such as "jesters, karnataki dramatists, dashaavtari, sarodwalasattriya and sarangiwala. Conversely, under Sayajirao - III, the state committed itself to teaching its people about music".

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2. Dance

Maharaja Sayajirao encouraged not only music but also a range of dance forms in the state of Baroda. Indian kings have always had dance troupes sent to commemorate royal marriages. In addition, it was often noted that the dancing ensemble earned a share of the bride's dowry due to their recognized distinction. Vadodara was thrilled by a dance group when Maharaja Sayajirao wedded Tanjore's Maharani Laxmi Bai in 1880. A troupe of dancers accompanied Maharani Chimnabai, who was proficient in both Carnatic music and Baharatanatyam. The dancers received backing from the royal family, which contributed to the development of Vadodara's dance culture.

3. Garba

One of Vadodara's biggest Navratri celebrations is called the "United Way of Baroda". With soothing music and the charming voice of "Atul Purohit", United Way is one of the well-organized places for garba. Garba fans shouldn't miss it. The man of timeless masterpieces like Gujarat Gaurav and The Garba Legend, "Shri Atulbhai Purohit", is well-known around the world. During the Navratri festival, everyone visiting Gujarat should make time to witness the "United Way of Baroda Garba: a grandiose Mahotsav" that is well- known throughout the state. United Way is the largest garba ground in the world, according to the "Limca Book of Records". Whether you're from Antarctica or the Brazilian rain forests, Baroda is the place to be for those nine days. It is said that in order to get out of Baroda, you had to witness Atul Kaka's garba and move your feet to its music. Millions of people from all around the world inevitably gather at this place each year.

Introduction: The Confluence of Art and Culture

Raja Ravi Varma, often hailed as the "Father of Modern Indian Art," holds a significant place in the cultural history of India. His unique ability to blend European academic art techniques with traditional Indian themes brought a revolution in Indian art during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Among the many cities that contributed to his artistic journey, Vadodara (formerly Baroda) stands out as a beacon of cultural synthesis and artistic patronage. This article delves into the profound impact of Raja Ravi Varma's association with Vadodara, exploring his contributions to the city's cultural heritage and the lasting legacy he left behind.

Early Life and Artistic Evolution

Maharaja Sayajirao Gaekwad - III was not merely a patron but a collaborator in Varma's artistic journey. He provided Varma with a fully equipped studio in the Laxmi Vilas Palace, the royal residence and ensured that the artist had access to the finest materials and models. This environment of encouragement and support allowed Varma to experiment

During his time in Baroda, Raja Ravi Varma produced several masterpieces that are celebrated to this day. Among these, the portraits of the Gaekwad royal family stand out for their lifelike representation and attention to detail. Varma's portraits of Maharaja Sayajirao Gaekwad - III, Maharani Chimnabai and other members of the royal family are remarkable not only for their realism but also for the dignity and grace they convey.

However, it was his mythological paintings that truly immortalized Varma's legacy. Works such as "Shakuntala Patralekhan" (Shakuntala writing a letter), "JatayuVadham" (The death of Jatayu) and "Damayanti and the Swan" were created during his stay in Baroda.

These paintings, characterized by their dramatic compositions, rich color palettes and meticulous detailing, brought to life the stories of Indian epics like the Mahabharata and Ramayana.



The Moon of Baroda: A Possessed Possession?

In the world of jewels, few gems have captivated the imagination as deeply as the Moon of Baroda—a pear-shaped, 24.04-carat canary yellow diamond. Unearthed from the legendary Golconda mines between the 15th and 17th centuries, this masterpiece has adorned the treasuries of emperors for centuries, carrying with it a legacy as rich as its golden hue.

The diamond first travelled to the western city of Baroda (now Vadodara) to grace the royal family of the Gaekwads, where it remained a symbol of opulence and power for over 500 years. However, like many diamonds of great renown, it is said to carry a curse—abad omen that brings misfortune to its possessor if it crosses the sea. This belief echoes the fates of other legendary diamonds such as the Koh-i-Noor and the Hope Diamond, as if these treasures, once claimed by India, should never leave its embrace.

The Gaekwad family eventually gifted this precious possession to Empress Maria Theresa of Austria, the only female monarch of the Habsburg dynasty. Yet, upon her death—a demise rumored to have been hastened by the diamond's curse—the Habsburgs returned the stone to its rightful place, back into the hands of the Gaekwads. In 1860, the diamond was set into a pendant, where it remained close to its homeland for decades.


The story of the Moon of Baroda resurfaced in 1953, draped around the neck of the iconic American actress Marilyn Monroe during the promotion of her song 'Diamonds Are a Girl's Best Friend'. With the diamond, came its reputed curse, and Monroe's career began to falter soon after. Her tragic death from a barbiturate overdose at the age of 36 in 1962 further fueled the legend of the diamond's misfortune.

Over the years, many dupes have surfaced and various countries have claimed ownership of the Moon of Baroda, yet the true fate of the original gem remains shrouded in mystery.
